The activities of Cultural and Social Narratives Laboratory are aimed at providing an opportunity for the public to get knowledge about contemporary cultural and social issues, as well as engage in discussions and processes revolving around them. The laboratory's primary objective is conflict analysis and transformation through culture and dialogue. We aim to make contemporary popular scientific literature accessible to the public, assisting people to defend and exercise their cultural rights. We pursue the goal of extending the cultural discourse, supporting different social groups through culture, and thus fostering democracy in Armenia and in the region.

Established by a group of cultural practitioners, scientists, researchers, and artists, CSN Lab is an interdisciplinary research platform which explores and

presents contemporary and sensitive topics in various formats, facilitating discourse on those topics among different social groups and communities.

The principles and values of democracy lie at the heart of all the projects of the laboratory.

We believe that open work style, plain language, and application of different media formats have the power to make research in humanities and social sciences more accessible and impactful. That is why our projects are participatory, implemented through various research methods and tools, and aimed at making the past and the present

more discernible.

Cultural and Social Narratives Laboratory engages in a wide scope of activities, including:

- Memory studies and memory activism

Participatory and inclusive approaches enable profound research on complex and

Cultural and Social Narratives Laboratory attaches great importance to memory studies as memory is an integral part of one's identity. Memory projects uncover the forcibly forgotten past, making it possible to understand the cause-and-effect relationships of a number of contemporary issues and problems, which are typically left out of the official history and discourse.

In modern times, we witness more frequently how dictatorships and antidemocratic regimes (including those in our region) firstly destroy memory institutions, refuse to acknowledge the criminal past of their state, and thus abstain from repeating the crimes committed in the past. Through memory studies we intend to reduce such risks by advocating for democracy and transparent governance.

The projects related to memory studies and memory activism encompass such matters as the subtle layers and manifestations of individual and collective memory, alienated identities and the traumatic past, consequences of oblivion and the historical roots of contemporary problems.

During the last few years, we managed to implement projects which extend and decentralize the thematic framework of memory studies, transcend narrow academic domains, demonstrate the importance of freedom of memory and the right to memory, and serve as a basis for considering memory in the context of such phenomena as the complicated past, urban space, queer culture,

coexistence, etc.

Through memory projects we contribute to society's self-reflection, integration of memory fragments, conceptualization and popularization of memory.

CSN Lab has published a number of voluminous works dedicated to memory studies. They include:

- Research on social and spatial memory of the historic Firdus and Kond districts that feature the rare examples of Yerevan's vernacular architecture, cultural multilayeredness and coexistence.
- Research on the Getar River in Yerevan, repeatedly stifled by the municipal authorities during the Soviet and post-Soviet period, forced out of the city and memory space, and partly covered by concrete.
- Research on the ethnic and cultural coexistence of the Armenians, Jews, Greeks, and Turks in Istanbul's Balat district.

- Interdisciplinary research on queer memory in post-Soviet Armenia.
- Collection and analysis of urban narratives and mental maps of forcibly displaced people as a result of wars and conflicts.
- Obliteration of different ethnic groups' places of memory located in Tbilisi during the Soviet years, and its impact on the identity of the city and its citizens.

All the listed projects were implemented by studying different manifestations of memory and post-memory, using such *methods* as collection and examination of oral stories, semiotic analysis of space, archival research (family, official), mental maps, memory and space visualization, as well as other tools

of researching the past.

The Complicated Past and Colonialism

Given the situation in Armenia and in the region, and the urgent problems stemming therefrom, we constantly touch upon the colonial past and its political, cultural and social effects. Our studies show that appraising the colonial past as well as specifying and examining neo-colonial manifestations are no less important than proclaiming independence.

The traces and consequences of the colonial past manifest themselves in politics, economy, language and mind, architecture, urban planning, culture,

environmental protection, resource management and even everyday practices. However, they don't become a topic of internal reflections, contemplations, public discussions, research projects and policymaking. Consequently, large strata of society do not get a chance to spot the cause-and-effect relations of the past and the present, understand the roots of a number of contemporary problems, form a language and acquire basic knowledge

to analyze the past and the present.

The situation in Armenia and in the region has deteriorated many times due to colonial pressures. The roots of current conflicts and public discords can often be traced back to the complex colonial past along with its consequences.

Cultural and Social Narratives Laboratory has implemented a number of projects to present the topic of (neo)colonialism from different interdisciplinary perspectives. create a platform for dialogue between the colonizer and the colonized, attract the attention of researchers. artists, cultural practitioners and media professionals and cultivate a public discourse. We want to make knowledge about colonialism accessible to the public, help people develop everyday language to address these problems, create an opportunity to reconsider

their own identity and environment and enable them to protect all of that.

Urban & Public Spaces

The complicated past of the region has left an imprint not only on people's but also on urban and public spaces' memory and history. Urban transformations have had a considerable influence on social structures, as well as on interactions among citizens.

While studying the processes of formation and development of urban and public spaces, we can often notice how the Soviet urban planning ignored and modified the pre-Soviet-era architectural and urban identities. The post-Soviet period, in turn, brought new problems – neglected urban and architectural

heritage, degraded public spaces and abandoned production zones, irregular and illegal construction, legal regulations involving corruption risks and other problematic issues. The resulting chaos reveals the unfree nature of the interaction between the city and its citizens, and stresses the need to study space not only from an urbanistic but also culturological and anthropological perspectives.

The city belongs to people and shall be realized/used by them. The accessibility and freedom of public spaces symbolize democracy and horizontal interpersonal relations. Our projects aim to form a solid foundation and language for people so that they voice their concerns about urban planning and defend their cultural rights.

The projects of Cultural and Social Narratives Laboratory focus particularly on the vernacular districts of urban space and the protection of their memory as a manifestation of popular architecture and democracy. We want to reveal and protect the tangible and intangible cultural heritage of urban and public spaces, highlight its significance and demonstrate that it is constantly being subjected to various pressures by the authorities and the business sector. We touch upon these urgent issues in different formats, engaging architects, urbanists, cultural practitioners, media sector representatives and other specialists.

The urban environment shapes and reflects not only history, architecture and daily life, but also citizens' identities and the boundaries of freedom and diversity. As a result of the interplay between the environment and the public, space transforms into a unique documentary

of cultural processes.

Cultural Rights

Through its activities, Cultural and Social Narratives Laboratory strives to contribute to the formation of a broad discourse around cultural rights in Armenia considering that cultural rights belong not only to artists and creators but also to the wider public. Our goal is to protect the rights of authors, artists, and creators, as well as to advocate

for ensuring the accessibility of culture, education and science. In cooperation with cultural practitioners, creators, the civil society, independent media and other agents, CSN Lab created and published thematic literature, organized lectures, master classes,

workshops, discussions and other events.

By cultivating a discourse on cultural rights, we contribute to the protection of human rights and to the development of democracy.

In its various projects our laboratory has addressed a number of topics related to the protection and popularization of cultural rights. We have succeeded in bringing to the public domain not only the matters related to the internationally recognized cultural rights and making them key items on the agenda, but also urgent issues

common to Armenia and to our region, such as the protection of vernacular districts, preservation of tangible and intangible heritage, equal opportunities to take part in cultural life, cultural sustainability, artistic freedom, manifestations of neo-colonial policy, gender

discrimination, queer culture, etc. 31

Queer Culture and Gender Studies

Topics related to gender identity and queer culture continue to be relevant and highly sensitive both in Armenia and throughout the region. However, they are often ignored and do not become part of public and political agendas in the long run. Our laboratory is interested in studying these topics in the context of cultural rights, as well as in supporting queer artists.

Within the framework of different programs, *CSN Lab* has examined the state and non-state cultural institutions' sensitivity to gender issues, examining the gender aspects of their policies and activities. We have attempted to understand what role and involvement

Armenia-based female cultural practitioners and artists have, how willing cultural institutions are to collaborate with LGBTIQ+ artists and to exhibit or represent their artwork.

of such projects is the program
of dialogue between Armenian
and Georgian female artists
in which the participants
present their creations, share
experiences and approaches

during exchange visits.

As regards queer identity and gender equality, our research project on queer memory is significant inasmuch as it is the first attempt – not only in our country but also in our region – to analyze such a multi-layer and complex phenomenon. The study of this extremely sensitive topic lays the foundation for more comprehensive and multidimensional research on queer culture.

Studies on gender identity and queer culture are useful not only for our laboratory but also for cultural organizations operating in the country.

The conducted research can also be used by state and non-state institutions, decision-making bodies and organizations as a basis for cultural reforms, and for promoting gender equality within Armenian society, which is still

largely patriarchal. 35

Cultural and Social Narratives

The activities of *CSN Lab* revolve around internal and external, obvious and inconspicuous conflicts. They are sometimes invisible and yet alive in our memory and post-memory, in history and the complicated past, in communication with our own and surrounding people's diverse identities, in realization of our rights, in everyday life and in other domains.

Though our activities mainly focus on memory studies, cultural rights, public and urban spaces, gender equality, etc., we also constantly touch upon the narratives occurring during crisis situations, such as issues of media narratives and language formation around the Covid pandemic, various conspiracy theories, etc.

The programs implemented by the laboratory aimed to cover issues and topics which are hard for people and communities not only to voice and popularize but also to contemplate about; talking to oneself about those issues is also a challenge. Together with uncovering any new topic or

approach, *CSN Lab* has strived to cultivate around them a discourse as a starting point for debates involving

different social groups.

True to democratic values and principles of inclusiveness, all of our projects have targeted different social groups scientists, artists, activists, media sector representatives, cultural practitioners and civil society at large. At all the stages of program design and implementation, our organization gives priority not only to women and people with non-heteronormative gender identities, but also to those subjected to repressions due to their political views, people living in conflict/war zones, refugees, forcibly displaced people and others whose experience and willingness to cooperate make our projects more comprehensive and multifaceted. Thus, our programs emphasize that culture and art are directly linked to the protection and popularization

of democratic values.

Our work has contributed to the formation and development of discourse around a variety of contemporary topics, establishment of a dialogue in the context of various conflicts. creation of accessible language, tools and approaches regarding the matters of different

disciplines.

Receiving the attention of domestic and international media towards our projects, and cooperating with foreign artists, cultural practitioners, activists and organizations is inspiring to us. Promoting the development of civil society in Armenia

and in the region through our programs is particularly encouraging to us.

We continue our work, revealing the entwined relationship between cultural and social issues, planning to extend the cultural discourse and the realm of social sciences through interdisciplinary research, expand the field of contemporary art, create a new language and methods of activism, establish a dialogue between different social groups and thus foster democracy in

Armenia and in the region.




